


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Working On The Edge: Surviving In The World's Most Dangerous Profession: King Crab Fishing On Alaska's High Seas

I'd give this 4.5 stars if I could - author is a terrific, no-holds-barred writer with a definite gift for words. It was said by a critic about Sebastian Junger's "Perfect Storm" that you "could taste the salt". For this book I'd say the writing lets you feel the monumental fatigue and the icy water washing over your feet. It's less romantic than "Deadliest Catch" TV show, as it so plainly describes what real life is like on these boats. No music, just work and more work. The only thing I found a bit puzzling is that at one chapter the author waxes on about the fierce pull of the sea and goes back to the life, and the next all of a sudden he is in major burn-out mode. In any case, money well spent and deserves all the good things said about it.

This is possibly the best of the many, many books about commercial fishermen. Spike Walker is a terrific writer and brings you along with him as he makes the transformation from rookie to seasoned crab catcher. The book is not just descriptive, it's hypnotic in the best sense of the word. While reading "Working the Edge," there were great chunks of time when I was transported to the deck of a crab boat...I was right there...dodging crab pots, smelling the stink, feeling the cold and the spray, loving the warmth of a cup of coffee after a long shift. The book never got stale and never stalled...I imagine crab fishing gets repetitive...fishing books certainly do. Walker keeps it fresh and interesting to the last page. He's joined my pantheon of "real life" writer gods -- John McPhee, Sebastian Junger, Tim Cahill and Jon Krakauer, who blend deft writing skills, a slightly off-kilter slant, and usually, their own thrill of discovery, to their work.

If you like the show the Deadliest Catch, you'll love Spike Walker's book. Incredibly well-written, indeed one of the best writers I have ever read, Walker writes about his experiences as an Alaskan crab fisherman during the "gold rush" era of the early 1980's. His tales of serious disasters and incredible loss of life tell the deeper tale of the Alaskan crab fishery, deeper than the edited version of the Discovery channel. You will find yourself searching Google maps to place Walker and his boat's travels. A truly fascinating book I loved it and I think you will too.

I picked this up on a trip to Alaska as a teenager and loved it. This was also well before Deadliest Catch ever aired. It gives a glimpse into the the heyday of derby fishing that you always hear the captains reminisce about on Deadliest Catch. I just bought another copy to replace one that I

"Loaned" out.

I was in Kodiak the same time Spike was up there. I also was a commerical fisherman after putting in my dues as a dock foreman at Pacific Pearl Seafoods.
