

A great alternative to just reading the dictionary and writing down all the unknown words, this is a great read for lexical nerds who want to expand their vocabulary or even anyone wanting to speak with more sagaciousness. Broken up into helpful sections depending on what kinds of words you want to know, it has a great format that makes it even easier to read and process.

Actual, functional words you may use in day-to-day conversation or writing rather than those obviously rehearsed, obscure or unusual words that you would need to try and squeeze in somehow, and get a big eye-roll for using, for obviously trying to impress.It's focused in sections rather than one "big book of words" that run on from A to Z.It goes beyond mere dictionary definitions, however, I would still double check the words for context in usage outside of the book's definitions and usage.All in all, this is the vocabulary I've always wished I had.
