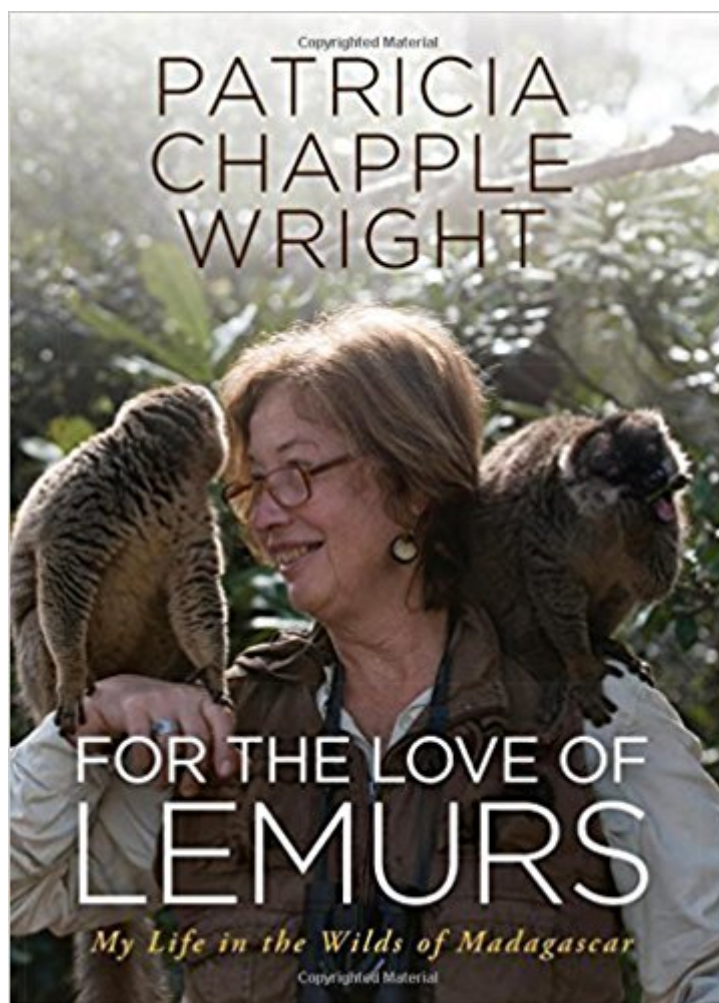


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For The Love Of Lemurs: My Life In The Wilds Of Madagascar

The many honors she has received include a MacArthur Fellowship and the National Medal of Honor of Madagascar. Dr. Wright is currently a professor in the Department of Anthropology at Stony Brook University.
