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Synopsis

From the author of *Fingerprints of You*, whom Judy Blume calls "a remarkable young novelist," comes a compelling and lyrical novel that explores how one teen rebuilds her life after everything seems lost. My father disappeared on a Tuesday that should've been like any Tuesday, but eventually became the Tuesday my father disappeared. Tired of living in limbo, Callie finally decides to investigate her father's disappearance for herself. Maybe there was an accident at the construction site that he oversaw? Maybe he doesn't remember who he is and is lost wandering somewhere? But after seeing a familiar face in a photo from the Great San Francisco Earthquake of 1906, she wonders if the answer is something else entirely.

Gr 10 Up-On Tuesday, Callie's father disappears. He simply never comes home from work. There are no family problems to suggest that he left and no reason to think there was a crime committed. When Callie's friends take her to an exhibit documenting the San Francisco earthquake of 1906, she thinks she sees her father in one of the photographs. Could it be a relative from the past? Could time travel be real-or accidental? Chapters alternate between Callie's days and the experiences of the man in the photograph as he deals with the horrific quake and his loss of memory. This is a strong read and will pique interest in the actual earthquake. Callie and her mother get to know each other on a different level than they did before, much as families do when a tragedy occurs. The author adeptly shows that life goes on, even in the middle of a sorrowful situation. Callie begins to

develop romantic feelings for an old classmate, her band gets its first gig, and her gay best friend goes through a bad relationship. This title is reminiscent of Susan Beth Pfeffer's *The Year Without Michael* (Bantam, 1987), in which the case of a missing brother never gets resolved. Readers wanting more stories about characters who experienced the earthquake will want to read William Lavender's *Aftershocks* (Harcourt, 2006) or Deborah Hopkinson's *Into the Firestorm: A Novel of 1906* (Knopf, 2006). While she speaks to many people nobody seems to have a clue where he could be or what could have happened to him. The only link Callie has is an old photograph of the Great San Francisco

Earthquake, but that's bizarre or isn't it? Callie doesn't have to search alone. She has her best friends Beckett and Madison who are often by her side. They distract her by discussing their love lives and they do their best to help her with her search. Callie tries to find some normalcy again, she's running, she loves her band and possibly there's even room for love, but she doesn't give up on her father. She misses him terribly and keeps remembering every small detail of their connection. Will she be able to find him again? Invisible Fault Lines is an original story.
