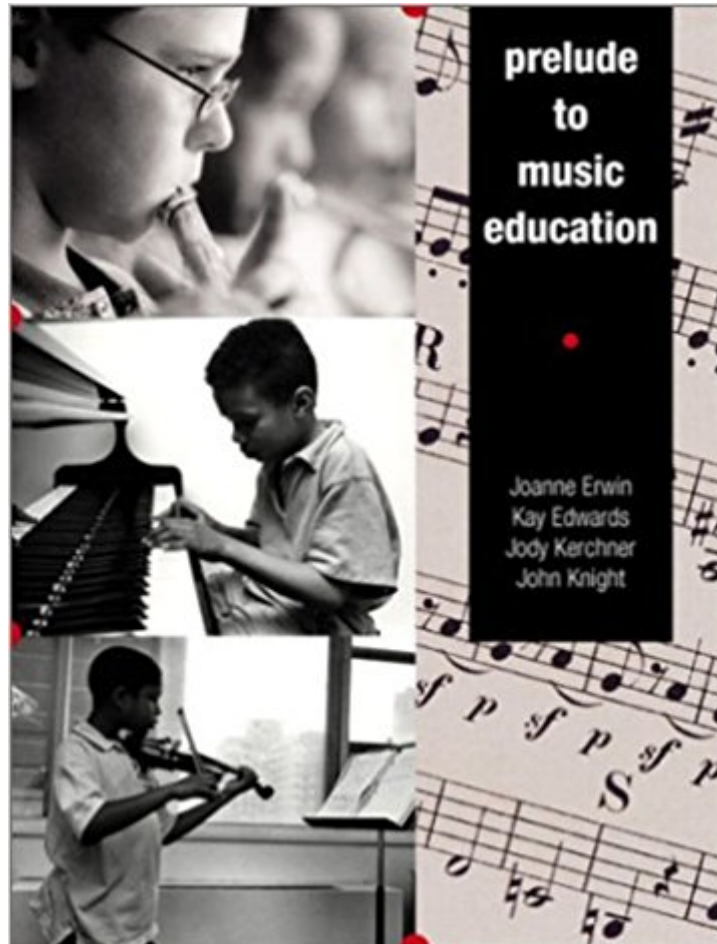




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Prelude To Music Education

Prelude to Music Education offers students exploring the profession a glimpse into the different aspects of music teaching. Great emphasis is placed on practical approaches of teaching music classrooms and rehearsal settings, especially means for incorporating the National Music Content Standards. All major areas of music education are discussed in an introductory fashion. Each chapter opens with a scenario appropriate to the topic and ends with lesson plan examples and resource materials. Each chapter also includes questions for class discussion or individual student reflection. Suggested music teaching and observation assignments encourage students to take an active role in becoming familiar with the music education profession. This book was designed for introduction to music education courses, but it also could serve individual students who wish to

explore the music education profession.

Dr. Joanne Erwin is string pedagogy specialist at Oberlin Conservatory of Music and conductor of the Northern Ohio Youth Orchestra. She has been a presenter at state and national music education conferences and is published in the leading journals for string education and music education. Her performing instrument is cello and she has conducted youth and honor orchestras throughout the country. Her public school teaching experience was in grades 4-12, strings in Illinois and Texas. Dr. Kay Edwards is early childhood and elementary music specialist at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. She has served as a director of early childhood music education programs at Oberlin Conservatory and at UNC-Greensboro. She has presented at state, national, and international music education conferences on topics related to general music and multicultural music education. She has published articles and teaching materials in leading journals, basal series, and MENC texts. She is a guest teacher in local schools and a participant in ethnic music ensembles. Her public school teaching experience was in preK8th grades in Arizona.

This book has some of fantastic information in it, but it's grossly overpriced. It was assigned for my Intro to Music Ed class, and even the professor said to avoid buying a copy if you could avoid it and to share the books that were bought by classmates. It's a comprehensive overview of the different areas of music education, but I wish the authors would have put even more content in the text and discussed even more topics within the broad subject of music ed.

This book is one of several books required for a general music methods class I teach. It is an excellent overview of music education, especially as an introduction to music education. As a professor it is valuable to me because it is well-written, well-organized with interesting, clearly written assignments for the students. It is worth the price. The authors have figured out how to write for the beginning music education student and I'm grateful they wrote it.
